- STEP #1 Find the perfect spot: good foot traffic, some shade, and plenty of visibility to passers-by.
- STEP #2

  Before you get your lemonade stand up and running: Be sure to double-check your local food permit regulations. Some municipalities may require certain permits for free food distribution, while others may make exceptions for situations like lemonade stands. You can look up these regulations by searching for food permit exemptions + [your town or county].
- STEP #3 Prepare your stand: Get your lemonade supplies, plus a table and some chairs. Download our toolkit and print out copies to hand out, and consider printing some copies of our zines for folks to read and/or take home. Recruit a friend or two to join you, and make a big sign to let people know there's free lemonade available.
- STEP #4 Let people know about it: Email friends, family, and community members; start a Facebook page; post flyers around the neighborhood. Register your stand on our website!
- STEP #5 Host your stand: Set up your stand and chat with your neighbors about libraries: encourage them to get involved!
- STEP #6 Spread the word: take photos & share on social media (and share them with us!). Email us at forthepeoplelibraries@gmail.com and tell us how it went!





#### WHAT'S SO GREAT ABOUT PUBLIC LIBRARIES?

Libraries are so much more than book collections! What makes them so great?

- Free public spaces (where you can just be, without having to spend money) are becoming increasingly rare.
- Access to technology is increasingly critical to attaining employment, education, healthcare, housing, and other vital needs and services.
   Libraries are the largest provider of broadband access in the country. They help bridge the digital divide (where people's lack of access to technology is used to further shut them out of work, education, healthcare, housing and other aspects of public life) with by offering free public computers, free wifi, and other lendable devices, as well as classes on how to use them and navigate an increasingly digitized world.
- Libraries are places that **foster social belonging** and **bring generations and neighborhoods together into shared space and conversation**.
- Libraries can provide **access to information held behind paywalls** via magazine subscriptions and access to books in other libraries via interlibrary loans.
- Library collections and resources **expose people to new ideas**, **diverse cultures**, **and forgotten histories**.



#### WHAT'S SO GREAT ABOUT PUBLIC LIBRARIES?

- Libraries also offer so many resources, programs, and services, including:
  - **Social services** (help with taxes, job searching, public benefits, etc.)
  - Family genealogy research and local history archives
  - **Equipment and tool check out** (laptops, cameras, home and garden tools, etc.)
  - Research databases
  - International media
  - Storytelling and children's activities
  - Book clubs and author events
  - Meeting rooms and public assembly spaces
  - Arts and crafts programming and education
  - Book binding and special collections
  - Free passes to local attractions, such as museums, zoos, and more
  - Language classes
  - Heating, cooling, and clean air spaces
  - Access to technology and free public wifi
  - o Entrepreneurship classes and resources
  - Work and study spaces





of Americans are registered borrowers at public libraries (which means nearly half of Americans don't have a library card). Ask your neighbors if they have a library card to your local public library: not only is a library card a passport to a huge range of resources and services, it's an important number that libraries report to get and keep critical funding!




#### MYTH:

Nobody visits libraries anymore. We don't need them, everybody has the entire internet on their phone. Libraries are obsolete.

#### NOT TRUE! IT TURNS OUT:

Libraries are more popular than ever in the United States, in large part because of the strong shift to include digital materials alongside traditional ones like books & magazines.

- Public libraries have more registered borrowers than ever (174.23 million, or 53.57% of the population)
- The total library collection size nationwide is larger than ever
- Library collection use is higher than ever: the 174.23 million registered borrowers at U.S. public libraries had an average collection use of 16.85 items in 2019, up 10.77% from 2014



#### Nationwide, there are more library programs (6 million) and higher program attendance (125 million) than ever:

- Library program attendance now accounts for 10.01% of all visits to libraries, up 84% from 2009
- States with the most programs per capita have more visits (88.25%), collection use (51.31%), and registered borrowers (12.21%) than states with least programs per capita

#### It's never been more expensive to operate a library, and government funding hasn't covered library operating expenses since 1992.

- Average operating expenses per library are up more than 17.00% since 2014
- Libraries would be in a \$4.38 billion deficit if relying on government funding alone
- There's never been more libraries (17,468) or librarians (51,190), but US library staff is still paid 35.07% below a livable wage for a family of three on average.



## TEN WAYS

YOU CAN HELP YOUR LOCAL

#### GET (AND USE!) YOUR LIBRARY CARD

Actively using your library card to borrow books, ebooks, graphic novels, media, and other resources is critical to helping libraries maintain and expand their annual public funding sources.



#### VOTE IN YOUR LOCAL ELECTIONS

Find out what elected body oversees your library - is it a city council, a library board, or some other group? Support, vote for, and advocate for elected officials who will support public libraries.



#### SPEAK UP AT PUBLIC MEETINGS

Once you know who the decision makers are, attend public meetings and make public comments on the record. Not sure what your library needs? Get to know your director and staff, and ask them.



#### REQUEST MATERIALS YOU WANT TO SEE

Most libraries accept - and indeed welcome! - patron requests for books or other media, and will buy those materials for the community. If you want to see a more diverse collection, submit a request!



#### JOIN A LIBRARY SUPPORT GROUP

Most libraries have a Friends of the Library group or a foundation that helps support the library. Join other library lovers to help volunteer, fundraise, and get the word out to your neighbors!



#### SPREAD THE WORD ABOUT LIBRARIES

Libraries work tirelessly to get the word out about programs and services - and you can help! Tell your friends and neighbors about what's happening at your local library and all it has to offer.



#### SHOW UP TO PUBLIC LIBRARY PROGRAMS

Actively attend programs that your library is putting on, and bring a friend (or five). Branch out and try new options - many libraries depend on meeting attendance goals to maintain diverse programming.



#### FIGHT CENSORSHIP AND BOOK BANS

Speak up locally for the freedom to access and read diverse materials - fight back against book bans and censorship. For more, visit UniteAgainstBookBans.org to learn about ongoing efforts you can join.
